BEFORE DEPARTURE

Proof of negative COVID-19 test results

Travelers must have a paper copy of a negative COVID-19 PCR test result. The test must be taken a maximum of 72 hours before departure to South Africa.

Travelers arriving without a COVID-19 PCR test result are required to take a COVID-19 test and quarantine on arrival at their own cost.

72 hours before departure

Quarantine may be required

Travelers arriving without a negative COVID-19 test or with symptoms will be required to take a COVID-19 test and may be required to quarantine on arrival at a designated facility at the traveler's cost.

Travelers will also need to provide proof of accommodation address should they need to self-quarantine at the time of arrival in the country.

HEALTH REGULATIONS

Before visiting South Africa you may need to get the following vaccinations or take the following precautions. It is best to seek medical advice as your individual health and your planned activities will be a factor. Seek advice 4-6 weeks before travel.

Required Vaccinations

- There is no risk of yellow fever in South Africa. The government of South Africa requires proof of yellow fever vaccination from travellers 9 months of age or older who are arriving from a country with risk of yellow fever, including transit in an airport located in a country with risk of yellow fever. This does not apply to travellers who are older than 60 years of age or who hold an exemption certificate for other reasons. Routine and Recommended Vaccinations and Medications

- It is recommended that travellers are up to date on routine vaccinations including measles-mumps-rubella (MMR), diphtheria-pertussis-tetanus (DPT), varicella (chickenpox), polio, and yearly flu shots.
- A hepatitis A vaccination is recommended as travellers may contract hepatitis A through contaminated food or water in South Africa, regardless of where they are eating or staying. A
- hepatitis B vaccination is recommended for those who may have sexual contact with a new partner, who may get a tattoo or piercing, or have any medical procedures.
- A typhoid vaccination is recommended for most travellers, especially those staying with friends or relatives, visiting smaller cities or rural areas, or for those that are adventurous eaters.
- A rabies vaccination is recommended for those planning an outdoor holiday, for wildlife professionals such as veterinarians and researchers, for those who are taking a long trip or moving to South Africa, and children as they are more likely to receive animal bites.
- Malaria is a risk in South Africa. Travellers to certain areas may need to take anti-malarial medication. Consultation with a doctor regarding this medication should be sought prior to travel. For further information on this recommendation, please visit the CDC [Malaria in South Africa](#).

CUSTOMS

IMPORT REGULATIONS

Free to Import

Alcohol (restricted to travellers 18 years and over)

All of the following:

- 2 litres of wine; and
- 1 litre of any other alcohol.

Tobacco (restricted to travellers 18 years and over)

All of the following:

- 200 cigarettes;
- 20 cigars; and
- 250 grams of tobacco.

Currency

- Funds of R25,000 and over must be declared.

Perfume

- 50mL perfume; and
- 250mL eau de toilette.

Other Goods

- Personal goods, such as clothing and toiletries.
- Other non-commercial goods not exceeding R5,000 in value.
- Three months' worth of medicine for personal use, accompanied by a prescription.

Note: Passengers importing expensive items for their stay may be asked to leave a refundable deposit with the customs officers.

Prohibited

The following are goods which cannot be brought into the country.

- Narcotic and habit-forming drugs.
- Fully automatic, military, and unnumbered weapons.
- Fireworks and explosives.
- Poisons and other toxic substances.
- Cigarettes with a mass of more than 2kg per 1000 units.
- Counterfeit goods.
- Prison and penitentiary manufactured goods.

Restricted

These goods are strictly regulated, and in most cases require a permit to be obtained prior to arrival.

- Firearms and weapons require a permit from the [South African Police Service](#).
- Gold coins.
- Unprocessed minerals, such as diamonds and gold.
- Animals and their derivative products, such as meat, require a permit from the Director: Animal Health. For further information please visit [Import animals and animal products](#). Herbal products require a permit from the [Department of Health](#).

- Plants and their derivative products require a permit from the National Plant Protection Organisation of South Africa. For further information, please visit [Plant permit](#).

EXPORT REGULATIONS

Free to Export

- Personal goods not for commercial purposes.
- Travellers may carry R25,000 when leaving South Africa.
- South African residents 12 years and over may carry R160,000 when leaving South Africa. Residents under 12 years may carry R50,000. This sum may be carried once per calendar year, with evidence being provided in the form of a letter from an authorised dealer.

Prohibited

The following are goods which cannot be taken out of the country.

- Same as prohibited to import list.

Restricted

These goods are strictly regulated, and in most cases require a permit to be obtained prior to departure.

- Protected species and products protected under CITES may require a permit for export.
- Certain animals, plants, and their derivative products may require an export permit.
- Objects of cultural importance require a permit from the [South African Heritage Resource Agency](#).
- Diamonds and precious metals/jewellery require a permit from the South African Diamond and Precious Metals Regulator.
- Firearms and weapons require a permit from the [South African Police Service](#).

Mandatory COVID-19 test on arrival

Travelers are required to take a COVID-19 swab test on arrival. Travelers are required to quarantine at their own expense in a designated hotel for 5 days.

BEFORE DEPARTURE

Proof of negative COVID-19 test results

Travelers must have a printed negative COVID-19 PCR (swab) test result in English. The result must be taken within 72 hours before the first departure point to Indonesia.


TESTING TYPES

PCR Test 72 hours before departure

ADDITIONAL DETAILS

Travelers arriving without a COVID-19 PCR test will be required to take a test on arrival and quarantine until results are in at their own expense, which could take up to 5 days.

Mandatory quarantine and testing

Travelers must quarantine for 5 days at a facility designated by the Indonesian government. Travelers must take a COVID-19 test during quarantine. If they test positive they must be relocated to a hospital. Those who test negative must continue a period of home quarantine.

IMPORT REGULATIONS

Free to Import

Tobacco

One of the following:

- 200 cigarettes;
- 25 cigars; or
- 100 grams of tobacco.

Alcohol

- 1 litre of alcohol.

Currency

- Funds of more than Rp100,000,000 or its foreign equivalent must be declared to the customs authorities.

Other Goods

- A reasonable quantity of perfume.
- Personal goods up to the value of US\$250 per individual or US\$1000 per family.

Prohibited

The following are goods which cannot be brought into the country.

- Narcotics and psychotropic drugs.
- Pornographic materials.
- Firearms and weapons.

Restricted

These goods are strictly regulated, and in most cases require a permit to be obtained prior to arrival.
